Black History Month: "Labor of Love"

Dr. Kenneth E. Robinson: Valiant Pioneer



Dr. Kenneth Ellsworth Robinson was born at Till's Hill, Hamilton, or May 29, 1911, the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Hilton Eden Lefroy Robinson He moved to North Shore, Pembroke as a young boy growing up and showed an early interest in reading books. He also displayed a great love of music. He enjoyed listening to the North Village Band and was particularly fascinated by the tuba-player with his cheeks puffed out, blowing the enormous instrument. However, it was the flute that stole his heart as he learned to play it by making music for the Gombeys. Many years later Dr. Robinson would serve a judge at the annual Gombey Festival.


Dr. Robinson attended The Berkeley Institute and the Excelsion Secondary School. He left Bermuda in 1931 on a Bermuda Technica Scholarship to attend University College in London, England. He returned in 1936, with an honors degree in geography. He joined the staff of The Berkeley Institute as a teacher and soon after served as principal at Sandys

Heritage: Dr. Robinson married Miss Rosalind Taylor in 1937, and had two children; Shirley Pearman and Kenneth Robinson Jr. Secondary School. Parents teachers, and students alworked with the governing body to raise money to pay his own and the teachers' salaries Dr. Robinson then taught at Victor Scott for four years ther returned to Berkeley where he established the Commercia Department and an RSA center. He became president of the BUT in 1940; the founding principal or Harrington Sound School in 1945; founding principal or Francis Patton Schools in 1950 Supervisor of Schools in 1950 and Chief Education Officer for the Ministry of Education in 1970.






Minister Furbert continued, "Navigating both positive and negative aspects can be difficult. But having support is crucial, support of family, of friends, and the support of the Government." The gathering marked the anniversary of 15 year old Claudette Colvin's refusal to submit to segregation laws on a Montgomery bus in 1955. Claudette's mentors, Rosa Parks and Dr. Martin Luther King, helped to secure the jailed teen's release. Eventualities led Rosa Parks to take similar iconic actions in December 1955. Additionally, Claudette was one of four people willing to be a complainant in a year-long historic court battle which ended successfully at the U.S. Supreme Court in December 1956. The event also highlighted Mr. David Wingate who played a key role in rediscovering the cahow years after being shunned as a nerd as a teen. Swedish teenager, Greta Thunberg, was highlighted for her efforts to show that teens can impact the world.


